- III. Announcements
  - a. Recent Grant Success! K. Gruben, B. Travers and K. Ausderau, and Karla Ausderau recently received grants.
  - b. Big 10 Voting Challenge – please try and promote in your classes.
  - c. Recent Donations – A. Mason explained Lolas Halverson Fund has sat dormant for years. Due to a recent contribution, the balance is now \$55,000. T. Gattenby - Design Concepts firm owned by former engineering students who used to work in Adapted Fitness., constructed a bike that adapts to disabled children's growth. Project has been crowd-funded. Also, a new adapted client who wishes to remain anonymous (former cardiac surgeon), came to Tim for help. He experienced great deal of success and has donated a new piece of equipment for the adapted gym to show his gratitude.
  - d. Update on Building Status – We are moving closer to MSC as a landing place. End of Spring 2020 is target destruction date. Campus is hiring an architectural firm to look at renovating MSC.
  - e. S. Wright thanked everyone for patience in switching over to online leave system from yellow forms.
  - f. K. Koltyn – William P. Morgan lecture 10/25 @ 4:00pm in Room 1140. Dr. Jack Raglin from Indiana University is the featured speaker.
  - g. K. Gruben – reminder to attend seminar next week.
  - h. October 24 – Badgers' Best Practices Event – PE alumni come back and discuss best practices with students.
  - i. D. Edwards – All of Us team is downstairs, come and sign up and get \$25!
- IV. Committee Reports
  - a. OT – 75<sup>th</sup> anniversary event went very well. Thanks to Gary, Steve, Ronnie, Drew, OT faculty and everyone who helped. Received several donations as a result: Dick & Barbara Weaver \$25,000 matching legacy award established. Ruth & Wayne Zimke gift for research in occupation science – endowed gift. Another endowed scholarship from

previous donation. Students prepping for homecoming parade. Entry level OTD program design moving forward. Undertaking faculty search.

- b. PE – Digitized archive files. Developed a PE advising checklist with Dan. Individual goals and action steps discussed to promote program and move forward.
- c. Undergrad Studies – HPHE planning is moving forward. Hoping to offer for Fall 2019. October – Majors Fair on 10/24, advising sessions week of 10/22; Kines club fundraiser @ Nitty Gritty on 10/19.
- d. Grad Studies – Exploring how to advertise new grad student mentoring program. Stephanie starting on Monday – she will be in touch with faculty who might have students coming in this fall and looking for avenues to promote the program.
- e. Marsh – Dec. 7 deadline for pilot grants.
- f. Adapted Fitness – Lot 62 will be turned into a parking garage. Tim is concerned about disabled parking for clients. There is a recruitment program on campus involving McBurney, Office of Student Recruitment and Rehab Psychology to explore the lack of disabled students at UW and ways to improve recruitment of this population. Two meetings held so far - going very well. Adapted Fitness apparel will be for sale next week.
- g. Diversity Committee – Go Big Read campus discussion is 10/16.
- h. Facilities – P. VanKan explained that the plan is to construct a parking garage next to the new meat science building – 600 spaces (+150 more than now).

#### V. Undergraduate Studies Committee

- a. 146-399 New Course Proposal – Independent study course number for ANAT&PHY subject heading. Needed for more accurate transcript notation.
- b. 146-699 New Course Proposal – Independent study course number for ANAT&PHY subject heading. Needed for more accurate transcript notation. Motion to approve both/seconded. Approved.
- c. 742-235 Course Change Proposal – Proposal to move Kines 235 to the new ANAT&PHY subject heading for continuity. Motion to approve/seconded. Approved.
- d. Promoting Activity for Diverse Abilities Certificate – This certificate has been in the planning stage for quite a while and we have received lots of feedback from all levels. T. Gattenby explained the need to get more people interested in promoting opportunities for people with diverse abilities. The certificate has a service learning component. Students have indicated that they want to return for more adapted volunteer experiences. D. Edwards wanted to know if individuals from the community could complete this under the Division of Continuing Studies. Tim explained that the original vision did include this, but the needs of our current students will be met first. It will not include special students at first until certificate is established. Motion to approve/seconded. Approved.

#### VI. Graduate Studies Committee

- a. 742-555 New Course Proposal – Sports Science and Athlete Monitoring. This proposal is for D. Bell's 508 class that was offered this past summer term. It can be taken for graduation and undergraduate credit. Received good feedback from students. Enrollment will be limited to 20 students who will learn to use monitoring equipment and data analysis. It is more advanced than Cindy's 312 course. A. Mason motion to approve by grad committee/seconded. Approved.
- b. 695-814 New Course Proposal – Inter-professional Communication – OTD online post-professional program. Offered as 508 this past summer. It teaches individuals in the

program how they can enhance communication skills in inter-professional venues. K. Gruben noted that participation portion may require a rubric and that the grading scale doesn't go below 70%. Motion to approve by grad committee/seconded. Approved.

- c. 695-873 New Course Proposal – Advanced Outcome Measurement in OT. Currently being taught as a 508. Intent is to bolster outcome measurement skills. Same comments as 695-814 proposal from K. Gruben re: syllabus. Motion to approve by grad committee/seconded. Approved.
